Overcoming Intergenerational Trauma

16 years ago, Hurricane Katrina changed New Orleans forever. Now, some Katrina survivors are having children of their own in the midst of two new collective traumas: COVID-19 and Hurricane Ida.

A growing number of our youth (over **32**% of those we cared for this year) are **young families**. These mothers, fathers, and children face significant challenges to their well-being, heightened by layered experiences of childhood trauma and societal stressors that too often lead to poor health outcomes and quality of life.



Research shows that the neurological and social development of future generations is affected by the lived experiences of those who came before them. Our **Two-Generation (Two-Gen) Parent-Child program** works to break the cycle of intergenerational trauma by providing a best-practice, whole-family approach to build a "village" of support for our young families.

Our team works patiently with young parents to help them develop healthy bonds with their children, while also reaching out to family, friends, and community members to build a buffer against toxic stress.

When it comes to the development of young minds, everything matters—from the intrauterine environment to postpartum, early childhood intervention, and policy solutions. We ALL must do our part as a loving and supportive community to allow young families to thrive.

SHELTER Update: Matt, the Artist

Six years ago, Vice Documentary Films captured the stories of our youth in the documentary SHELTER. Among them was a kind, genuine artist named Matt.



The film followed Matt as he scored a job at Liberty's Kitchen, obtaining on-the-job skills that he still uses as an employee in the restaurant industry.

We recently caught up with Matt and were delighted to learn that he has reconnected with family—and is creating amazing artwork and video game graphics.

Ultimately, Matt says he wants to be a full-time artist. We have no doubt he will achieve his dreams.














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
